Dear Parents and Carers

What a whirlwind of 5 weeks it has been! Our Year 6 children sat their SATs and were so calm, composed and ready to do their best; we are all immensely proud of every single one of them! I think they get so excited about having a lovely breakfast with all of their friends they forget that the SATs followed this each day, which is absolutely the way it should be. Thank you to all of the staff for their team effort in ensuring everything always runs so smoothly.

Year 2 have had the opportunity to do the same with their 'quizzes' and likewise with the addition of a breakfast to get them off to a good start every day, they too worked so hard to show just how much they have learnt during KS1. Fabulous work children we are all so so proud of you!

We have had trips, residential visits, swimming, visitors to school and a myriad of exciting learning opportunities across each and every classroom in the short space of 25 learning days!

SIAMS – We had our follow up monitoring visit which takes place after every full SIAMS inspection. After our successful 'Outstanding' judgement in October 2016, it was superb to hear that our work has been recognised and we will now lead training for other schools over the coming months.

Achievement for All – Yesterday we also had a visit which involved touring our school, meeting staff, governors, children and parents and looking at a wealth of evidence to see if we could achieve 'Achievement for All' accreditation. I am thrilled to say we were extremely successful and indeed have a significant amount of evidence towards the Quality Mark to become a lead school. Achievement for All recognises the achievement within a school of groups of children with additional learning needs and disadvantaged groups of pupils and overall learning for the whole school. These were also noted as strengths by the Ofsted Dashboard in 2016 with our EYFS, Year 1 phonics and KS1 and KS2 data.

Well done Mrs Cotton and all of the staff involved for your hard work in achieving this award.

Building work – Just a reminder that building work will commence on Tuesday 30th May at around 8am. I will be liaising with the project manager at school on Tuesday to ensure the site is safe and they are ready to carry out groundworks. It is hoped that this will be all completed within the first 2 weeks of the project and then construction of the building can begin. The deadline for completion of the project still remains the 14th July 2017. I know Year 5 are very excited to have the opportunity to learn in this new space in September; as indeed are we all at school.

Parents' Evening May 2017 – We have held 3 full meetings this year as opposed to 2 full meetings and an open classroom in the summer term. We hope you have found this additional opportunity in the summer term to talk about your child's progress and their achievements and next steps really useful. We will continue with the open classroom where you can see your child's work after school during term 6 and it is a wonderful opportunity to pop in and see your child's teacher before the academic year is complete. I know the staff appreciate that opportunity to see you before the end of term and share the learning success of your child.

Meet your child's new teacher – We will be holding our regular meet the new teacher meetings in term 6 and you will have the opportunity to see what the curriculum looks like for your child and the expectations for learning moving forward. These dates will be announced during term 6 when all of the class arrangements are confirmed.

Science Dome – You may have noticed a lot of activity around the Dome. Water is now connected, along with power and by the end of June (if not sooner) we will be able to access technology from both the Log Cabin and Dome! We have had astro turf placed on the floor of the Dome and the furniture is now in too! We are aiming to have some of the branches trimmed from the tree canopy over the Dome; nothing significant just a tidying exercise really. We are also covering the ground area with bark, which has been created from other branches that have been trimmed from our school site – thank you Mr Easey great job! We have purchased some amazing acoustic equipment in the form of clouds; these will hang from inside the Dome to absorb the sound.

We are so excited about the children being able to have their science lessons in the Dome. We know it will be a fantastic space in which to learn and make them feel like real scientists and hopefully inspire them to continue to have a love of science as they grow. The Ogden Trust have supported the school with a £2 500 donation to purchase lab coats and equipment – how lucky are our children! Thank you to Miss lea and Mrs Leach for all of their hard work too.

School Site – Our school site is pretty amazing but it takes a huge amount of hard work and effort to maintain. Mrs B works with children every Tuesday mainly on the Star Garden, Values Garden and all of the beds and fruit plants we have on site. A pretty hard task in 2 hours per week! Our Caretaker Mr Angus is busying himself in sanding down all of the benches and re-painting them and they are already looking great. He is going to do the same with the benches before the end of term too.

We are looking in to options as to how to ensure our site looks its best at all times. We think we may have found a solution so are hopeful we may have our own groundsperson to carry out this really important work! Watch this space.

Thank you to all of you who constantly support the school we can't do it without you! Have a great half-term; keep safe and healthy and we will see you all on Monday 5th June 2017.

Sun Safe Accreditation

We are in the process of achieving a Sun Safe Accreditation. This involves educating every child on the importance of how to stay safe in the sun. Treetops

A message for all Parents/Carers using Tree Tops after school club.

We request that during periods of hot weather that children attending Treetops have suncream (which they will have to apply themselves) and at hat at all times.

Tree tops after school club is a pre-paid pre-booked only service offering tailor made child care for our parents and carers 5 days a week.

Pre-booking ensures we are confident that all pupils are accounted for at the end of every school day.

At Tree tops we have a fixed number of spaces available for each of the hours available. We staff our provision based on the number of children attending. Most recently, we have had some incidents where these numbers have been exceeded as a result of pupils being left in school without having been pre-booked into Tree Tops.

All parents using Tree Tops have agreed to the terms and conditions of use and have been given a copy of the same. A copy is also available on the school website. To ensure that only pupils for whom a pre-booking has been made to attend, please note as of the 24th April any pupil whose name is not on the Tree Tops register, and therefore, for whom no pre-booking has been made, will be brought to the school office and the parent will be contacted to collect the children affected.

This will ensure that all pupils have been pre-booked and therefore appear on the Tree Tops register for that night and that payment has been made or is forthcoming.

However, we do understand that emergencies happen and children will always be accommodated in such circumstances, but **we do expect the parent or carer to notify us of the circumstances by 2.30pm** at the very latest and that payment for the emergency booking is made on collection of the child or that night online.

I thank you for your co-operation with this procedure, which I am sure you will agree, has pupil safety at the core.

Sun Protection

It goes without saying that children need suncream put on in the mornings before school to protect them during playtime and outdoor activities within school. Can we ask all parents to make sure their children have hats, suncream (named) and a drink with them at school especially during the hotter weather. This is particularly important to children who attend Treetops as they do make the most of the fine weather and play outside.

Archery

Before Christmas we had an archery taster day where all children in Y1 to Y6 were able to have a go at this new sport. Following on from this we have started a NEW archery club after school on a Tuesday this term. The children have really enjoyed the club and others have consequently expressed an interest to join.

There will be a new block offered starting from Tuesday 13th June 2017. Further information will be sent out when we return after the half term break.

Fairford hosted its first archery competition on Monday 15th May 2017. Eight other schools in the area attended alongside the two teams from Fairford. This gave more children in Maple class the opportunity to try out the sport using proper bows and arrows in addition to the adapted kit that they tried before Christmas.

Y4/3 Quadkids – qualifier

Fairford entered two teams of ten into the Y3/4 Quadkids qualifier competition. It is an athletics competition that involves children competing in four different events: standing long jump, howler throw, 50m sprint and 400m run.

I am pleased to report that Fairford has qualified through to the Cotswold finals.

Class Updates



Apple

Although it has been a very short term, it has certainly been action packed! We have been really impressed with how far the children have progressed in all areas but particularly with their reading.

The children have enjoyed listening to and acting out the fairy tales, The Three Little Pigs and Little Red Riding Hood. During their train journey, the children have used the puppet theatre and have developed their own interpretation of the stories.

We have focused on Materials this term and this has incorporated a lot of science which the children have really enjoyed. They have talked about the properties of materials and they have used the terms, 'man-made' and 'natural'. In our outdoor area we have developed a Sensory House where the children have explored different textures and materials.

In RE this term, we have been focusing on the story of The Good Samaritan. This has included lots of discussion and reflection on how to be a good friend and our friendship tree is now bursting with hearts which the children receive when they have shown a kindness.

We all wish you a very restful and enjoyable holiday and we are looking forward to the final term of Apple Class!

Walnut



Walnut class have been busy exploring 'The Magic Faraway Tree' and 'Enchanted Wood'. We have fallen in love with the characters and the lands they visit – even creating our own stories about a land we would like to visit at the top of the tree. Miss Jones has really enjoyed looking at the different versions of our novel that Walnut children have brought in to share with the class. Miss Jones and Mrs Robinson would like to say a huge thank you to all the Walnuts who created an optional DT toadstool house for our science display at home because they look fantastic! Walnut have been learning all about plants in science, along with the differences between evergreen and deciduous trees. In maths, we have been focusing on measure, multiplication and division as we come to the end of this shorter term. Summer is here and we are really enjoying the many outdoor learning opportunities that our beautiful school site has to offer!

Cypress

Another busy term in Cypress Class learning all about The Plague and The Great Fire of London. Children are so engaged in their learning and can recall a growing number of historical facts. The class had fun learning the symptoms of the plague and acting them out!

A large part of literacy over the last few weeks has been report writing. We learned a Talk 4 Writing piece for the main heading and the introduction, children then went on to write their own subheadings and paragraphs. The final outcomes for these are amazing – well done Cypress.

During maths, children have revisited addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Children are becoming really secure in both written and mental strategies.

We have had lots of art and design technology going on this term, clay rats, painting silhouettes of London aflame and tudor houses. Thank you so much for all the contributions of boxes and straw. The children LOVED doing these and really do not want to see them burn – a suggestion for a future visit to the Fairford Fire Station (letter to follow).



We must of course mention the government 'quizes' that the children completed this term. The children worked tirelessly to showcase what they have learned over Year 1 and Year 2. Every child did themselves proud.

Looking forward to Term 6, where we will begin to delve into Fire, Fire by Stuart Hill. Lots of children already have their own copies and we really appreciate parents and carers support with the children's engagement with this topic. We can't quite believe we only have one term left! Have a lovely half term break.

Olive



This term has certainly whizzed by quickly! In Olive class we have been immersed in all things 'Egypt'. Our 'Talk for Writing' persuasion text set off the term allowing the children to learn where Egypt was located, what tourists could do there and how long the River Nile is. They enjoyed learning this text and as a result have produced fantastic work trying to persuade people to visit England. Within maths, we have become confident in adding and subtracting fractions, Finding fractions of a given amount and recognising equivalents to $\frac{1}{2}$. Their reasoning and explaining skills in maths are developing exceptionally well!

The most memorable day for us this term would be the discovery of the our very own Egyptian tomb. Excitement was high as we crawled through the tunnel leading to the tomb and tried to avoid the creepy crawlies! Once inside the tomb we were astonished to find the tomb intact with many beautiful artefacts. On the walls were hieroglyphics and pictures showing various things such as the burial procedure and a selection of Egyptian gods looking down on the sarcophagus. The children were able to bring out one artefact and catalogue it just as Howard Carter would have done. After this, we read extracts from Howard Carter's diary and thought about how he must have felt stepping foot in this undiscovered tomb for the first time and being able to smell the perfumes that the ancient Egyptians used. I do hope the children loved this experience as much as I did!

We have also just had a marvellous mummies day where we incorporated our science and literacy. The children set up an experiment using mummified and un-mummified tomatoes. We will observe them closely when we come back from half term! On this day we also wrote some amazing instructions on how to mummify a human (with no gruesome part missed out!). The children were fascinated with this topic and I was amazed they had so many insightful questions.

We are looking forward to carrying on with the Egyptians after half term.

Oak

It's been a short but busy term. We have learnt all about fractions, ordering them, comparing them, adding and subtracting them and finding fractions of amounts. Try to encourage your child to keep using this skill by asking them to find half of an amount of money or a quarter of a cake. We call this constant but regular practising Practise Makes Skilled.



We have also worked hard on our literacy using Talk for Writing. This involves matching words to actions and works as a recall tool when writing. The results have been amazing and the children have written some amazing pieces about Egypt and England.

Now to our Mummification Day ... firstly thank you for all the Beef Steak tomatoes! They are now sitting in our classrooms in various states of putrefaction or mummification! Over the next few weeks we will be observing them to see how well they are preserved ... or not! Results to follow!

On a final note, everyone in Oak has worked so hard on their reading and I am thrilled to announce that every child in the class is now a free reader. Thank you for your support and keep reading with your child ... it's a lovely way to relax together.

Beech

Did you know the Angles were one of the main groups that settled in Britain in the post-Roman period, founding several of the kingdoms of Anglo-Saxon.

This term we have looked at how to read and write runes. We have learnt where the invaders came from and have based a great deal of our literacy around Michael Morpurgo's retelling of the famous story of Beowulf. We have described Grendel's attack on the great mead hall and written Kennings about Grendel the 'Monster of the night and Beowulf the brave warrior. Each line is just two words long but very effective.

Have you ever tried to make ice cream without a freezer with just a couple of plastic bags, some crushed ice, milk, vanilla essence, caster sugar and salt? Well Beech Class have learnt it's possible and that it's eminently edible. Why not have a go now that the weather is getting warmer and have a treat.

Maple

It's the end of the term and the end of the year is only 1 term away.

In literacy and guided reading this term we have started to explore the world of the Vikings. As a historian, the children have written an account of the first Viking raid on Lindisfarne and written their own accounts of landing on a new land. Guided reading has looked at facts regarding Viking Long ships, why



they were used and how they helped the Vikings. Alongside this we have explored the truth behind myths surrounding the Vikings and common misconceptions such as them only being blood thirsty raiders.

In numeracy, we have spent this term completing the remainder of the mathematical domains. These topics have included data and statistics, geometry and reviewing core operations that have previously been covered to refine our skills. As the children move forward into the final term we will revisit some of the domain areas previously covered to refine our skills and in addition to this further develop our understanding at a greater depth. To support the children's' mathematical understanding of the core operations this will also remain a practise makes skilled area.

In science we have developed our understanding of living things and their environments and will continue to do so for 2 weeks after half term. We have already explored the life cycles of insects and plants. This has included looking at full and partial metamorphosis and the differences between flowering and non-flowering plants (including how they clone themselves). To complete the topic we will explore Mammal and amphibian life cycles (including differences between different types) and reasons for the number of young produced. Once this is concluded we will move on to looking at growth and reproduction including ageing and the changes that happen as we grow older.

The whole class have loved practising and performing the class production, and it has been great to see each member of the class taking ownership of their roles. We all hope that if you saw the production you have enjoyed it as much as the children have done putting it on for you. Not only have they had the task of learning their lines, which I know you have helped them achieve, but also the acting to accompany it (which they have helped develop).

As always, I would like to thank everyone that has helped or supported the class this term. The class really appreciate the time and support that you offer. Additionally, thank you for the support you have given the children and the costumes for the production. It is all greatly appreciated.
